<u>LAST MONTH MEETING— OCTOBER 16TH. — GUEST ARTIST == DAVID</u> EASTERBROOK

The wonderful David Easterbrook brightened our year by his recent visit. David is always an exciting visiting guest artist with his gentle ways of teaching so that one remembers his ideas, his broad knowledge, and his artistic skills. It is always exciting to have him visit us and this last visit was no exception.

David was given a large shimpaku "shrub" to convert into a lovely bonsai tree and we were not disappointed. First he emphasized that a bonsai had to harmonize, show where it is growing (as in nature), be believable, and have feeling and motion in the design.

This was a "shrub" with many branches growing in every direction. It seemed to tell us that it really was a windswept specimen that grew on the rocks in the mountains but how do we bend such a rigid main trunk in the direction that we want without damaging it and accomplish the wind swept style? It was stiff and had considerable dead wood around the live vein. David showed us the technique. First he used a root cutter and stripped as much dead wood as possible along the length of the branch. Since it was still rather stiff, he took a large root cutter and cut vertically into the center of the branch at several locations along the branch. Next he wrapped the branch with wet raffia and tightly wrapped it around the branch which would hold the live vein against the center wood. Next came some heavy wire and now the bending could be accomplished with minimal damage to the branch.

Next came the cleanup of unattractive branches and the bending of the remaining trunks to produce a harmonious windswept tree. Fine wiring of the small branches and placement was in the eye of the artist and David has that eye. There was not enough time to finish the tree but it was obvious that the potential was there to end up as a wonderful juniper with character and personality.

Peter brought in a huge log like stone (very heavy). David demonstrated what the shimpaku would look like if planted over the stone. It was something very special to see. - Mitch

The afternoon workshop was sold out with ten participants who worked through the entire session. David made a long first inspection with each person discussing the background and possibilities of each tree, thus getting everyone started. In some cases more advanced members helped participants bring out the tree that David saw. Overall it was a really good workshop and all of the presenting trees looked considerably better than at their start.

Finally, we will have a work shop in the afternoon, so bring material to work on and tools.
